Steve Thayer graduated from the University of Puget sound Law School in 1976, and has practiced law in Southwest Washington since 1977, with an emphasis in criminal defense and accident injury litigation. Over the years he has recovered millions of dollars for victims injured in auto and motorcycle accidents. He has also tried and won criminal cases involving all kinds of charges including Assault, Drug Delivery, DUI, Robbery, Sexual Assault, Vehicular Homicide, and First Degree Murder, and successfully defended marijuana grow cases throughout the Northwest. He is a Founding Member and former Vice President of the Washington Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, has published and lectured extensively, was featured as a Super Lawyer by Washington Law and Politics in 2000, 2001, 2003, 2004 and 2005, and appears in the Bar Register of Preeminent Lawyers. He is admitted to practice in the State of Washington (1977), the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Washington (1980), the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, the United States Supreme Court (1983), and has also specially appeared in civil and criminal cases in California, Idaho, and Oregon.



Amy Baddgor graduated from the University of Portland in 1998 with a degree in Criminal Justice. Since then, she has been employed with the Washington State Department of Corrections as a Community Corrections Officer supervising adult felons released from both local jails and state prisons. In 2005, she began specializing in an all-female caseload, a first in the state, working closely the offenders to identify needs and make referrals to community resources. Since the passage of SSB 6639 in 2010, Amy has been working with both men and women sentenced under the Family and Offender Sentencing Alternative, providing opportunities for families to stay together and improve their lives.



Tony grew up in Milwaukie Oregon. He went to Rex Putnam High School and Portland State University where he earned a Bachelor's Degree in Administration of Justice. Tony received his law degree from Gonzaga University in Spokane. Tony began his legal career in the Spokane County Prosecutor's office while still attending law school. In 1994 as an intern in the Spokane Prosecutor's office, Tony started doing criminal trial work on Assault and DUI cases. After graduation from law school, Tony became a Deputy Prosecutor for Spokane County. In 1997, Tony became a Major Crimes Prosecutor in Spokane. At that time, Tony began handling the most serious crimes in Spokane County including Murder trials, Third Strike cases, Elder Abuse cases, Robbery and most serious assault cases. In 2000, Tony became a Deputy Prosecutor for Clark County. Tony has prosecuted all types of criminal cases in Clark County. In 2004, Tony became a Major Crimes Prosecutor for Clark County. Since 2004, Tony has personally prosecuted many of the most serious cases in Clark County.
